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Year 10 Cambodia Trip

On the 18th of September, 31 students, 4 staff and 6 adult helpers from Carmel Adventist College left Perth for their annual service trip to Cambodia.

The trip began with a visit to SHE rescue (a safe place where victims of sex trafficking are cared for until they are ready for reintegration back to their community). The students were then taken to the killing fields and S21 where they witnessed firsthand the aftermath of the Khmer Rouge and the destruction and poverty it left in its wake.

The students were given the opportunity to engage in a wide range of mission work while being immersed in the rich culture of Cambodia. The team worked by building a goat shed, played with children who have been orphaned and some rescued from the most horrific circumstances. They also helped by setting up veggie gardens for two poor families and learning to cook, eat and spending a night with a family in the local village.

Here are two reflections from two of the students who went on the trip:

The Year 10 Cambodia mission trip was not only a learning experience, but it changed my perspective of the world.

The people there did not have fancy houses with cars parked outside. Rather, they had small huts and lucky to have bicycles as cars. Their houses weren't big but their hearts were...I learnt that the small things in life, the ones we take for granted, are those that we are

supposed appreciate the most. Things we cannot buy, like kindness, gratefulness, joy and love. These were the things that the Khmer people in Cambodia had that many of us do not acknowledge.

The sleep out was definitely an eye opener, giving us a glimpse of the life of a Khmer person. Teaching us to appreciate what we have and showing us how lucky we are to be born and raised in a country like Australia. (by Victoria Rosales)

I got so much out of this amazing trip! When asked, most students say their highlight of the trip was the village sleep-out or seeing all the happy people. Although I enjoyed those experiences, my highlight of the trip would definitely have to be getting completely dirty, sweaty, sunburnt and just plain gross while working on the builds! I have never worked so hard or gotten so sweaty in my life! I am so satisfied that I was able to work to the best of my ability for those people. We as a group managed to achieve in 3 days what would have taken the family a few months to do. It was all-so worth it when we finished working and got to see the gratefulness of the families. It made me realise that, by bringing happiness to others, you are bringing true happiness to yourself and it is the best feeling in the world......This trip has definitely inspired me to go out of my comfort zone to serve others and make this world a better place.
